
Sign up sheets for all events will be available on the bulletin boards in the entryway. Please consider joining us for one or more of these events and spending time with your Church family outside of Sunday service!

The Christian church is organized around the

story of the life, ministry and message of Jesus. We have two major "cycles"; Advent/Christmas/Epiphany and Lent/Easter/Pentecost. We are just finishing the first of these cycles and are poised to begin the second.

This year, in both worship and study, we will be looking specifically at a small portion of that story, one day to be exact. The theme is "24 Hours that Changed the World." We'll be looking at the last portion of Jesus' life on earth and the meaning these events have for us.

We begin our Lenten observance with a service for Ash Wednesday at 7:30 in the evening on Wednesday, February 17.

Lenten Bible study will be on Monday evenings Feb. 22, March 1, 8, 15, 22 and 29 from 7:30 – 9 p.m., and on Thursday mornings Feb. 18 and 25 and March 4, 11, 18 and 25 from 10 – 11:30 a.m. Sign up sheets are available in the hospitality area and the rear of the sanctuary.

Part of what we do as Christians is to "tell the old, old story of Jesus and his love." No part of that story reminds us more of that great love than the story of Jesus' ultimate gift for us on the cross, and God's triumph in the resurrection.


## Letter from Sue Porter dated January 5, 2010

Ash Wednesday, the begin-  
ning of Lent, comes on Febru-  
ary 17. We Christians observe  
Lent for 40 days (excluding  
Sundays) to examine our spiri-  
tual condition and to strive to  
improve our relationship with  
God.

Lent is also a period of spiri-  
tual preparation for Easter  
Sunday, the greatest day on the  
Christian calendar.

During Lent most churches  
have additional services. Some  
offer special Bible study events  
or classes in strengthening the  
spiritual life. It is a good time  
to study the life of a great  
Christian from the past and the  
ways that person developed  
closeness to God.

It’s important that each  
Christian practice spiritual dis-  
ciplines to “show that you are a  
letter of Christ. . .written not  
with ink but with the Spirit of  
the living God, not on tablets of  
stone but on tablets of human  
hearts” (2 Corinthians 3:3,  
NRSV).

## Habitat for Humanity of the Chesapeake

*The following is from the Home Dedication Ceremony for Andrea Brinkley on November 21, 2009. This is Habitat's 273rd house.*

*"Looking back, I never thought I would be a homeowner," says Andrea Brinkley who is grateful for the rough road that has brought her to purchase a home from Habitat for Humanity of the Chesapeake. "I can't be ashamed of my past because it has brought me here, to this. If someone else sees where I came from, then maybe that will encourage them to change too. I want to be an example."*

The past three years have brought Andrea the happiest days of her life; a new fiancé, James, a good job at Mercy Hospital, her driver's license, and now the joy of owning her own home. But it wasn't always so easy to smile according to Andrea, who sold drugs for longer than she can remember and used for 21 years. Ultimately, her addiction landed her six years in prison and cost her custody of children. After serving three years, Andrea was released on parole and went straight to Marian House in Baltimore, a safe community for women and children who are in need of housing and support services. While she knew she could have gone back home and lived with her grandmother or any number of others, Andrea also knew that it was time to take responsibility for herself, her life, and the lives of her children. It was time to be independent.

After just a year in Marian House, Andrea was able to rent a two bedroom apartment through "Shelter Care Plus," a Marian House program that moves women and their families to independent housing if they agree to certain conditions. Through the program, she underwent counseling each month and her progress was monitored and supported by Marian house staff. Her success in the program led to her getting her oldest child, Sauntia, back, and not long after, her son Anthony was returned to her as well. The reunited family of three moved into a two bedroom town home. *"The house is okay, but it's not mine."*

Andrea is now coming up on five years in the Marian House program. The program is structured to help women get ready to go out on their own. She is more than ready. She has been working hard to adopt Tyona, a seven year old, and Andrea is confident that becoming a homeowner will be the final step to stabilizing her family. Clean and sober for eight years, engaged to the man of her dreams, and soon to be a proud homeowner, Andrea Brinkley is a prime example of someone who has triumphed over the challenges of addiction and despair and is moving into a safe place to live and thrive with her family. *"I feel so blessed that God looked at me and saw that I was worthy. Thank you for making families like us happy."*
