Come and share with others, learning about how you too can enrich your life of faith.

Dear Friends,
It's a new year. Some of you are excited, and for others it's a "ho

hum" kind of feeling, like you've been here before. And of course you have. New years come with regularity, and if we let them, our lives can go on just as they always have.

But a new year is also a new opportunity, a sort of built in "reset" button.

There is a man who tells the story of his first day in algebra class. It was his second year of the subject, but he just couldn't seem to get it. He was paralyzed with fear and his stomach seemed as if it were bouncing up and down on a trampoline. A new teacher walked in. She looked a lot like the old teacher, and she was holding a book that looked a lot like last year's book. Before the class began, he thought he'd go up to the teacher and explain to her what a dunce he was with algebra. So he confessed his troubles, but she wasn't interested. "Oh yes, that may be true, but that was before you had me as your teacher. You are going to find that I do things differently. I don't like to get students who have done well in algebra before they have me. Too many prejudices. I prefer getting people who don't know a lot about algebra so I can teach them

from scratch." The boy went back to his seat and breathed a sigh of relief.

We all have chances to start over, especially with the things that are difficult for us. The prophet Isaiah reminds us of God's promise, "I am about to do a new thing" (Isaiah 43:19), and in the book of Lamentations we read of the mercies of God that "they are new every morning."

There is nothing ho hum about God's love for us and the new opportunities we have to walk each day in faithfulness. May 2009 be a year full of new experiences of the richness of God's love, and of joyful response to that love in worship and service.

Bible Quiz

In Jeremiah 18, God told Jeremiah to go down to the potter's house. Jeremiah obeyed. The potter was forming a vessel of clay on his wheel, but he accidentally ruined it. He reformed the clay into a lump and started over. He worked the clay again until he had a vessel that seemed good to him.

Jeremiah, the Lord's prophet, discerned that God was using the occasion as a lesson regarding individuals and nations. What was the lesson?

- God can do individuals and nations great good if they yield themselves to God's will.
- God doesn't really care in the long run whether people obey him or not.
- God's judgment doesn't really matter.
