World Communion

On October 7, 2018 we will celebrate World Communion Sunday, a time where Christians all over world, from many different cultures and denominations celebrate Christian unity and ecumenicism. We celebrate this unity through the Lord's Supper. Global Ministries, a non-profit dedicated to ecumenicism writes, "World Communion Sunday offers congregations a distinctive opportunity to experience Holy Communion in the context of the global community of faith. The first Sunday of October has become a time when Christians in every culture break bread and pour cup to remember and affirm Christ as the Head of the Church." Even though we choose this day to celebrate the fact that we are one, this is truly a reality that we should embrace every time we partake of the bread and the cup.

1 Corinthians 11:26 states, "For as often as you eat this bread and drink the cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until he comes." 1st Corinthians teaches us that we do not partake in Communion just as a memory that Jesus sacrificed himself on the cross for us, but that he will come again to judge the quick and the dead. As Christians we are called to be in covenant with one another, not just people who look like us and worship in our preferred style. Every time we partake in the Lord's Supper we are having a World Communion and we should see it as such.

In the United Methodist Church we have an open table, so all are welcome to share of the Holy meal. All people are welcome. All people are of sacred worth. All people are created in the *imago dei*, the image of God. We are all sinners saved by grace and God pours out his spirit on all. Joel 2:28 declares, "I will pour out my Spirit on all people. Your sons and daughters will prophesy, your old men will dream dreams, young men will see visions."

Trustees Report

After a brief hiatus to catch their collective breaths. the LRUMC Trustees met on Wednesday, September 5th. Last year's projects included repair/replacement of sanctuary gutters and downspouts, removal of the large tree near the playground, repairs to the arcade roof and repointing brickwork in that area. These were major successes in improving the physical structure of our church. Now the ceiling tiles can be replaced in the arcade.

Recognizing that our facility is over 60 years old and with age comes the need to maintain and upgrade our physical plant, the committee's focus is on the future. The Trustees are currently developing a master plan including such items as repair/ replacement of the entire sanctuary roof, painting of the entire sanctuary as well as multiple other rooms and removal of excess stored materials. Additionally, Trustees are looking at the needs of future programs such as the food pantry and a potential preschool. The budget is currently being put together for submission to the Finance Committee. Watch for updates in future issues of the Spire.

"That pesky attendance pad!!"

"Why do I have to sign in every week?"

"You all know who I am."

"What do you do with these sheets anyway?"

These may have been some of your thoughts over the years as you've seen the attendance pad passed from front to back, trying to sign it in between hymns, prayers and other parts of the worship service. So, I thought I'd let you know exactly what is done with those sheets every week.

First, we do track attendance. A volunteer marks

our members and frequent non-members as present or absent every week in our database.

Second, we check for visitors (those not on our database) and mark their attendance on file cards in the "Visitors File." When someone begins attending regularly, they are added to our database.

Third, we look for first-time visitors. A card is made for any first-time visitors and if they are nice enough to leave an address or email, we send a welcome letter from the office.

Fourth, it gives each of you an opportunity to check on names of those you do not know—new or regular attenders. (I've suggested a few times that we should start the attendance pads in the back so we would get to see the names of those who sit behind us. No one has ever taken me up on that, however!)

Fifth, Pastor Wayne receives a copy of the sheets. He uses them to put names and faces together. He also makes note of any frequent absent members.

Why track attendance?

- 1. I can make a list of regular attending members for the Lay Leadership Committee when choosing people to fill vacancies on committees.
- 2. If someone notices another person has been missing from worship, I can quickly check their last attendance date, at which point we can follow up with the individual.
- 3. When preparing names to be removed for Charge Conference, I can easily run a list of members who have not attended since a target date. (It has occurred more than once that a regular attending member has come up for removal. Fortunately, I knew the person and found they never signed the attendance sheets.)

So please do sign the pad when it comes by you. If someone you are with is running the sound board or serving as liturgist, please sign them in also. There is an attendance pad in the choir loft on the pulpit side for someone to sign in choir members. Take a minute to peruse those who signed before you. You may learn a new name!

ASSOCIATED HEALTH RESOURCE CENTER Village Health & Wellness Center Project The Roof Is Raised

Designed to engage the community in developing strategies to prevent illness, disease, disability and promote good health through outreach activities, the Village Health & Wellness Center Project mirrors the community's values, cultures, social interactions and other determinants of life that either promote or act as a barrier to good health.



How It Got Started

I decided to share my passion for this project with the congregation of LRUMC after 3 years of active participation in 7 different medical missions outreach to individuals living with HIV/AIDS and in communities at high-risk categories for contracting the virus, particularly those living in the remote villages in Nigeria and Senegal.

Mission In Action: LRUMC

After sharing my activities with LRUMC members, the Missions

Committee announced a desire to conduct a fundraising event. The event was titled "Buy-A-Brick" to build a facility in Ekpeye community in Nigeria to care for people living with HIV/AIDS (PLWHA). The event was organized and implemented with the goal to raise money for the proposed building.

Collectively, the Missions Committee raised \$3,454.57 toward the construction of a building to care for PLWHA. Funds raised at that event were instrumental to the initial laying of the foundation of the building. The total amount spent from start to the completion of the building was \$63,700.00

The Benefits of This Building

The building will help in the coordination of care and services to persons in need:

HIV/AIDS services and care, including testing and counseling preventative health education

self-management education and increased awareness on acute chronic health conditions treatment of minor injuries

wound care

women and children's health issues

locate and acquire resources to those who lack access to basic life supportive services and care
